## Subversions and Solidarities through Feminist Collaborations and Crossings

The Editors of the IFJP join the Vanderbilt Student Government in collectively acknowledging that Vanderbilt University occupies the ancestral hunting and traditional lands of the Cherokee, Shawnee, Choctaw, Chickasaw, and Creek peoples. Today, these people have nation boundaries in Oklahoma, North Carolina, and Mississippi, after the Indian Removal Act of 1830 led to the forced removal of southern tribes to the west of the Mississippi River. In particular, the University resides on land ceded in the Treaty of Hopewell (1795-96).

	Many indigenous body and military practices draw from Yoga	
	traditions and these predate the contemporary political	
	moment in India.	
	• For many people in India, Yoga is part of their everyday lives	
	and we as feminists should try not to cede this space.	
	Yoga provides to countless women an opportunity to reclaim	
	their bodies in culturally acceptable ways (unlike perhaps	
	aerobics or pilates) - and it is in that manner that we see the	
	IFJP morning Yoga sessions.	
	• The intent is significant: in the conference Yoga is seen as a	
	secular, feminist activity where scholars and researchers from	
	diverse backgrounds care for their bodies in a collective way	
	and challenge the conventional mind/body binary.
